Big Battery Hunt

To reduce the amount of rubbish we send to landfills we are setting Broke Hall a challenge! As a school we are aiming to support all our families to recycle their batteries through proving a drop off point for them at school. By recycling used batteries correctly we will prevent unnecessary harm to the environment and reduce the risk of fires such as the one at a recycling plant just outside Ipswich earlier this year. It takes at least 100 years for a battery to decompose, and the UK has one of the lowest battery recycling rates in Europe as we throw away over 600 million batteries a year.

The Eco-Council's gardening club are working on a mini garden to enter the school's competition at the Suffolk Show in May. The theme of the garden is 'A Garden Fit for a King'. We have had the idea of creating a display using the favourite flowers of the King, the late Queen and Camilla, the Queen Consort. 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Class Energy Monitors

We are asking teachers to select 2 'Energy Monitors' for their class. The monitors will be responsible for:

- Switching off the lights when the class leaves the room or when lights are not needed.
- Checking that all electronics are turned off when the room is empty.
- Making sure that doors and windows are shut when the class leaves for PE or assemblies (when the heating is running)
 We anticipate that there will be more jobs as we understand more about how to be energy efficient.

SOS Swifts (Save our Suffolk Swifts)

The swift is one of those birds it is easy to take for granted. They arrive in England for the summer to breed, yet over the last 25 years there has been a decline of over 50% of the birds that we see. One of the reasons for this is that they are having a hard time finding places to make nests. Swifts need to nest in places 4 to 5 meters high. We are hoping to fundraise to buy some Swift nest boxes to position on the walls of the main hall.

Learn Outside Day

We are asking teachers to take part in 'Outside Classroom Day' and pick a lesson to be delivered outside on 18th May.
